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Program for Landscape Maintenance Technicians to Offer Paid Training, Field Work, and Job Placement Opportunities

Buffalo Center for Arts & Technology (BCAT), The Riverline, and Buffalo Olmsted Parks Conservancy are pleased to announce that pre-registration is now open for their 2024 Landscape Maintenance Technician training program. Funded initially with seed money from the First Niagara Foundation in 2020, the program has grown to become a pipeline for individuals to get training—and good paying jobs—in the field. The program includes both on-site and online training and is scheduled to conclude just as many landscape maintenance employers are seeking seasonal employees. In March, BCAT and The Riverline will host a job fair where participants will meet employers—and potentially secure jobs.

One such seasonal employee who found full-time work is Patrick McIntyre. After successfully completing the program in 2020, Buffalo Olmsted Parks Conservancy hired him. Since then, he has worked his way up to become the Superintendent of the Conservancy's three golf courses. He wouldn't be where he is today, he says, without this program. "Coming in, I had absolutely no experience working in this field. But this program really focuses on getting trainees the practical know-how to do these challenging jobs."

The 2024 program is slated to begin on February 5th. There is no cost to participate in the program, but seats are limited and **pre-registration by January 29th is required**. This year, all participants will get PAID training up to \$1,500. This includes 30 paid hours on a field site and 30 hours of paid online classes—which trainees can do from anywhere. <u>REGISTER HERE</u>.

Participants will also get:

- a free pair of steel-toe boots
- a resume writing workshop to help them prepare for getting jobs

- a Landscape Maintenance certificate after completion of the class
- an opportunity to attend a post-training job fair in March

About the program Gina Burkhardt, President and CEO of the Buffalo Center for Arts & Technology, says, "Since its inception three years ago, we have trained more than 30 people who were well-prepared to land good jobs. With so many employers in the region seeking qualified landscape maintenance technicians every spring, this program offers an opportunity for graduates to be job-ready from day one. This training class is cost-free to participants **AND** includes paid training. If you're looking for a new career, there's no better way than to do so while learning *and* earning."

"The Riverline is excited to be part of a program that's training the future landscape maintenance workforce in Buffalo," says Jeff Lebsack, The Riverline Director. "We hope it will allow members of our community to start a solid new career—one that might one day lead to being involved in the operation and maintenance of The Riverline."
